

SNOW REMOVAL INFORMATION GUIDE

The City of Palmer maintains approximately 40 miles of streets and roads throughout the City. This is a quick guide to help explain the City's snow removal program and its priorities.

If snow is forecasted, park your vehicle off the street. This will prevent it from becoming plowed in or towed away. Most of all, the snow plows will have room for curb-to-curb plowing without obstruction.

Remember, parking is not allowed at any time on city streets or rights of way between the hours of 2:00 AM -6:00 AM from October 1 - March 31 when there is 2" or more of snowfall (Palmer Municipal Code 10.04.050). If your vehicle remains parked on the street it is subject to being towed at your expense per PMC 10.05.055.

SNOW REMOVAL AND SANDING PRIORITIES

Snow removal and sanding are performed on city streets and roads in the following order of priority:

- Main arterial and business district streets.
- Main feeder or collector streets leading to arterial streets and highways.
- Neighborhood residential streets and subdivisions.
- All other low density streets.
- Sidewalks

If too many obstructions are present on a street it will be skipped until safer conditions arise.

The snow removal priority map is available for viewing on our website.

SNOW BERMS ACROSS DRIVEWAYS

The snow equipment operator's main objective is to keep our roadways open for the safe passage of traffic. Whenever possible, operators try to minimize the size of berms across driveways through the use of snowgates. However, the City does not have the resources to completely remove snow berms. REMOVAL OF SNOW BERMS IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PROPERTY OWNER/RESIDENT.

SIDEWALK SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

As time allows, the City removes snow from sidewalks along its traveled streets. However, property owners (or occupants) and business owners (or occupants) of any premises bordered by a paved sidewalk are responsible by ordinance for removal of snow and ice from sidewalks. Please lend a hand to neighbors who cannot clear their own sidewalks and steps.



Residents/occupants and business owners/occupants that remove snow from their driveways or sidewalks are reminded that PMC ordinance prohibits placing, leaving, or depositing snow on any public street, sidewalk, avenue, or alley in the City from private property to public property. This prohibition also applies to a street or sidewalk that has recently been cleaned.
