DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW OF FUNCTION:

PALMER FIRE & RESCUE IS A DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF PALMER. THROUGH A LONG-STANDING CONTRACT, PALMER FIRE & RESCUE PROVIDES FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICES TO THE GREATER PALMER CONSOLIDATED FIRE SERVICE AREA.

HISTORY:

THE EARLIEST RECORD FOUND DESCRIBING FIRE PROTECTION IN THE PALMER AREA IS A FIRE NOTICE ISSUED BY FIRE WARDEN FATHER MERRILL SALZMAN ON OCTOBER 3, 1935.

October 17, 1935, a fire call rang out across the colonist's tent camp at about eight o'clock in the morning. The fire started around the stove pipe and was eating away at one end of the tent of the Red Cross nurse, Madeleine de Foras. Crews responded with backpack pumps to extinguish the fire.

OVER THE YEARS FIREFIGHTING HAS ADVANCED; HOWEVER, THE SPIRIT OF COMMUNITY HAS REMAINED FOREVER STRONG IN OUR MEMBERS. THE WAY WE ALERT OUR STAFF HAS CHANGED, FROM A SIREN TO PAGER AND SMARTPHONES; HOWEVER, OUR PERSONNEL STILL ANSWER THE CALL WHENEVER REQUESTED TO HELP OUR COMMUNITY.

- * FIRE SAFETY EDUCATION
- * RESPONDS TO SURROUNDING COMMUNITIES FOR ASSISTANCE
- * FIRE PREVENTION AND BURN PERMITS
- * FIRE INVESTIGATION




PALMER FIRE & RESCUE IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ENSURING THAT OUR PEOPLE AND EQUIPMENT ARE READY TO SAFELY AND EFFECTIVELY RESPOND TO 911 CALLS. THIS RESPONSE CAPABILITY IS MAINTAINED PRIMARILY BY OUR PAID ON-CALL STAFF. THE DEPARTMENT'S OFFICERS VOLUNTARILY STAFF EVERY EVENING FROM 6:00 PM TO 6:00 AM. ALL MEMBERS HELP STAFF THE STATIONS FROM 1:00 PM TO 9:00 PM.

PALMER FIRE & RESCUE (PFR) RESPONDS TO ALL FIRE AND RESCUE EMERGENCIES IN THE CITY OF PALMER AND THE GREATER PALMER FIRE SERVICE AREA. PFR'S RESCUE RESPONSE AREA INCLUDES HATCHER PASS AND THE ROAD SYSTEM FROM GLENN AND PARKS HIGHWAY INTERCHANGE SOUTH OF PALMER TO APPROXIMATELY MILE 129 ON THE GLENN HIGHWAY AND LAKE LOUISE. AGREEMENTS ARE IN PLACE TO WORK WITH THE OTHER MATANUSKA-SUSITNA FIRE DEPARTMENTS AS WELL AS THE ALASKA STATE TROOPERS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF FORESTRY TO ASSIST WITH DELIVERY OF SERVICES.

PALMER FIRE & RESCUE MAINTAINS RESPONSE CAPABILITIES TO BEST MEET THE NEEDS OF OUR UNIQUE COMMUNITY. IN ADDITION TO FIRE SUPPRESSION AND RESCUE RESPONSE, THESE CAPABILITIES INCLUDE TECHNICAL RESCUE DISCIPLINES.













2021 INCIDENTS BY HOUR OF DAY



TRAINING OVERVIEW

Training

PALMER FIRE & RESCUE WELCOMED A NEW TRAINING COORDINATOR IN 2021. THE TRAINING DIVISION IS NOW LED BY FIRE TRAINING COORDINATOR JOHN PREVOST AND TRAINING IS CARRIED OUT BY A CADRE OF INSTRUCTORS FROM BOTH WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT AND FROM SURROUNDING AND OUTSIDE AREAS. THE TRAINING DIVISION IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ASSURING THAT PALMER FIRE & RESCUE REMAINS IN COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL, STATE, AND LOCAL TRAINING STANDARDS AND REGULATIONS.

PALMER FIRE & RESCUE HAVE PERSONNEL THAT ARE TRAINED IN FIRE SUPPRESSION, FIRE INVESTIGATION, RESCUE, EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT. ALL OF OUR CERTIFICATIONS REQUIRE CONTINUING EDUCATION. NOTHING IN EMERGENCY SERVICES IS A "ONE AND DONE" TYPE OF TRAINING. STANDARDS AND REGULATIONS ARE CONSTANTLY CHANGING, THERE IS NEW EQUIPMENT AVAILABLE, AND STUDIES THAT CHANGE THE BEST PRACTICES. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE TRAINING DIVISION TO DELIVER UP-TO -DATE TRAINING AND KEEP OUR PERSONNEL AS EFFICIENT AND EFFECTIVE AS POSSIBLE.

UNFORTUNATELY, COVID HAS NOT LET UP, AND 2021 WAS FULL OF RESTRICTIONS. WE CONTINUED TO DELIVER TRAINING THROUGH VIRTUAL PLATFORMS, SMALL GROUP TRAININGS, AND USING LARGE APPARATUS BAYS AS CLASSROOMS TO ALLOW FOR PERSONNEL TO SPREAD OUT. THESE ADDITIONAL BURDENS PUT ON OUR TRAINING STAFF HAVE NOT MADE THINGS EASY, BUT THEY HAVE PERSEVERED AND CONTINUED TO DELIVER TOP NOTCH TRAINING TO OUR PEOPLE. COVID SHUTDOWNS CONTINUED TO NOT PROVIDE MANY OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUT-OF-TOWN TRAININGS FOR PALMER FIRE & RESCUE PERSONNEL, HOWEVER, APPLICATION PERIODS STARTED TO OPEN UP IN THE LATER MONTHS FOR TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES IN 2022.

LOOKING FORWARD, PALMER FIRE & RESCUE TRAINING DIVISION IS WORKING ON COMPLETING THE 2022 TRAINING CALENDAR, FORMALIZING OUR DRIVER TRAINING PROGRAM, INSTITUTING A FORMAL NEW RECRUIT TRAINING PROGRAM AND CONDUCTING MORE LEADERSHIP TRAINING FOR OUR OFFICERS

AND POTENTIAL FUTURE OFFICERS. WE ARE ALSO ADDING ADDITIONAL MONTHLY TRAINING NIGHTS FOCUSED ON DRIVER/OPERATORS, EMERGENCY MEDICAL EDUCATION, AND NON-ENTRY QUALIFIED FIREFIGHTERS. AS MORE TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES OPEN UP OUTSIDE THE DEPARTMENT, WE WILL BE SENDING PEOPLE OUT TO TRAININGS TO THEN BRING THAT TRAINING BACK TO THE DEPARTMENT AND PASS IT ON TO THE REST OF THE RESPONDERS.

IN 2021, WE HAD A TOTAL OF 5275.25 HOURS OF TRAINING LOGGED. THIS INCLUDES OUR REGULAR MONDAY NIGHT FIRE TRAININGS, OUR MONTHLY RESCUE TRAININGS, TRAINING WHILE ON DUTY CREW, AND CLASSES OUR PERSONNEL ATTENDED.
