Section 4. This zoning map supersedes and replaces the zoning map, adopted December 12, 2017, by Ordinance No. 17-015.

<u>Section 5.</u> Effective Date. Ordinance No. 22-008 shall take effect upon adoption by the city of Palmer City Council.

Overview of Contractual Relationship with the Palmer Museum of History and Art

As requested, the following is a foundational overview of the current contractual relationship between the City of Palmer ("the City") and the Palmer Museum of History and Art ("PMHA"); for the purposes of facilitating Council understanding and discussion.

Background:

On June 28, 2005, the City Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 05-017 authorizing the City to enter into a contract with the PMHA, an Alaska non-profit corporation, to be the official caretaker of all historical artifacts and museum properties for the City. That relationship was formalized by the execution on March 10, 2006, of an Agreement between the City and PMHA.

The purpose of this Agreement was to provide for the best interests of the City by creating a permanent house to catalog, preserve and protect those artifacts deemed to be of an historical nature to the creation, development, and continuance of the City of Palmer.

The 2006 Agreement provided for a total of five years in renewals but did not allow for extensions beyond five years without entering into a new Agreement. Since approval in 2006, the City Council has approved for funding amendments and renewal of the 2006 Agreement five (5) times: January 4th 2007; April 30th 2008; January 2nd 2009; March 12th 2010; December 28th 2010.

I am unclear of the status in 2011, however it appears the contractual relationship maintained under the terms of the 2006 Agreement.

In 2012, a new agreement was written incorporating many of the original elements of the 2006 contract but adding the following provisions:

- 1. An expansion of the duties of the PMHA to included museum services.
- 2. The PMHA will be able to use the City's building and property at 723 S. Colony Way to perform PMHA's duties under this Agreement.

- 3. Use of the 1.42-acre parcel and building located at 723 S. Colony Way by the PMHA for temporary events and special displays requires prior written approval by the City and any appropriate local, state, or federal permits.
- 4. This Agreement will extend until December 31, 2016, and may then be renewed in writing by both parties for an additional two (2) five (5) year periods.
- 5. The PMHA may not delegate duties or otherwise subcontract work or services under this Agreement without prior written approval by the City.
- 6. The City may monitor PMHA's compliance with this Agreement but shall not supervise or direct the PMHA except to provide recommendations and to provide approvals pursuant to this Agreement.

The 2012 Agreement is the active contractual agreement between the City and PMHA. This agreement does require to need annual appropriation by the City Council, which is done in the form of an Amendment.

The 2012 Agreement outlines duties of both the City and PMHA, including the process for termination of the Agreement, conflict resolution and barring any transfer or assignability of parties' responsibilities to another party. The 2012 Agreement was approved by the City Council on Febuary 14th, 2012. The 2012 Agreement expired on December 31st, 2016, triggering the ability to renew in writing, signed by both parties, this Agreement for two additional five-year periods.

On January 11, 2022, the second five-year term was authorized to be renewed in Action Memorandum No. 22-003 by City Council.

The last appropriation was an annual payment of \$55,400 to PMHA to run the museum and fulfil this Agreement's duties; this was approved on January 11, 2022, as Amendment No. 10. All Amendments #1-10 are related to the funding section (II.F) of the 2012 Agreement which has been amended on an annual basis since 2012. No other amendments/modifications have been made.

Key Points of the Current Contractual Agreement:

Below is a brief outline of key clauses in the 2012 Agreement, this is not the full contract but a summary of duties and responsibilities without the legalese.

- 1. The PMHA provides services to the City as an Independent Contractor under the terms of this Agreement.
- 2. Duties of the Palmer Museum of History and Arts:
 - a. Complete an inventory or catalogue of all items in the Collection (2006, 2012)
 - b. Complete the registration of all items in the Collection (2006, 2012)
 - c. Collect and register items appropriate to the PMHA purposes as described in the PHHA collections policy. (2006, 2012)

- d. Develop and maintain displays of Collection items as public display (2006, 2012)
- e. Hire staff to perform the duties under the Agreement (2006, 2012)
- f. Present to the City by Sept. 15th a proposed work plan and budget. (2006, 2012)
- g. Maintain accurate records for the City's grant of funds and make the records aviable for the City's review. (2006, 2012)
- h. Provide for the proper care and custody of the City's collection of artifacts utilizing accepted archival practices. (2006, 2012)

3. Duties of the City of Palmer:

- a. The City retains ownership of the collection of Artifacts originally identified in the 2006 Agreement and those items subsequently acquired by PMHA under this agreement. (2006, 2012)
- b. Pay the PMHA annually for expenses itemized in the annual budget. (2006, 2012)
- c. This agreement is subject to the annual appropriate by the Council. (2006, 2012)
- d. The City Manager is the designee to administer this Agreement. (2006, 2012)

4. Termination of Agreement:

- a. This Agreement may be terminated for cause if the PMHA shall violates any of their duties and covenants in the Agreement; in this event the City has the right to terminate this Agreement by giving written notices of at least 5 days.
- b. This Agreement may be terminated at the convenience of the City at any time by giving written notice to the PMHA, in the event of this occurrence the City owes the PMHA all costs not yet paid for any work the PMHA has performed under this Agreement.

5. Modifications of this Agreement:

Modifications may be made only in the form of a written amendment signed by both parties.

Summary Statement/Background:

City of Palmer residents approved an \$8,000,000 utility revenue bond for the wastewater utility in October 2020. The purpose of this bond was for the 2nd phase of the wastewater treatment plant facility for the installation of clarifiers as required as part of the City's consent decree. This project had a deadline of July 1, 2022.

The wastewater treatment plant facility phase 2 project was started in July of 2021. The funding sources set in place at that time included a \$1,580,000 loan from the general fund and a USDA grant for \$458,000 and a USDA loan for \$8,121,000.

In August of 2021 the City received the first tranche of Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) through the American Rescue Plan which could be used for water and wastewater infrastructure projects. The City chose to use these funds for the wastewater treatment plant facility phase 2 project. In January 2022, Council approved resolution number 22-006, for the General Fund to loan the second tranche of the SLFRF award which the City would not be receiving until August of 2022.

In April of 2022, the City public works director heard from the construction contractor that due to the supply chain the covers for the clarifiers would be delayed from the manufacturer until the fall of 2022. Also in April, Governor Dunleavy included a \$6,900,000 grant in the state's budget for the City's wastewater treatment plant facility phase 2 project. Receiving this grant will eliminate the need to take out a loan with USDA and in not doing so will lessen the burden on City utility customers. Also, the \$8,000,000 utility revenue bond that the voters approved will not be used but will be available for future use within the next 8 years.

The City initiated the grant agreement with the State of Alaska with resolution number 22-026 and the grant included expenses back to the April 15, 2022. Using the SLFRF funds and the initial loan from the General Fund, all the costs were covered except for \$161,184.00, prior to receiving the grant from the state.

Currently the Water Sewer Fund has a long-term loan of \$2,580,000 with the City's General Fund. This loan amount includes the \$1,580,000 that was loaned for the WWTP Phase 2 project and \$1,000,000 that was loaned for the first phase of the WWTP project when the Moving Bed Bioreactor (MBBR) was installed in 2017-2018. Once the Phase 2 clarifiers project is complete, the Water Sewer Fund will start the process of paying back the General Fund.

Summary Statement/Background:

The Mat-Su Pre-Metropolitan Planning Organization, MatSu Valley Planning for Transportation (MVP for Transportation), is seeking funding from the Governor of Alaska in the FY 2024 budget to support the formation and operations of the new Mat-Su Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO).

MVP for Transportation is the group that has been planning for almost two years for the development of a new MPO within the Mat-Su Valley.

An MPO carries out the metropolitan (transportation) planning activities for the urbanized area. It is anticipated that the U.S. Census will designate some portion of the Mat-Su Borough core area as an urbanized area in December 2022.

With the urbanized area designation, an MPO must be formed and designated by the Governor within one year to receive federal transportation funding.

This will be the third designation of an MPO within the State; AMATS in Anchorage and FAST Planning in Fairbanks are the other two MPOs.

After many meetings and analysis of various organizational structures, the Pre-MPO Policy Board (listed below) unanimously supported the formation of the new MPO as a non-profit organization, like FAST Planning in Fairbanks.

This resolution is in support of a funding request to the State of Alaska to form and operate this new non-profit organization. Seed funding for the newly formed MPO is necessary because federal funding for planning projects for the MPO will come through the State of Alaska as a reimbursable grant.

As a new non-profit organization, MVP for Transportation will need to pay for initial operating expenses and cover the lag time between ADOT&PF reimbursements. These reimbursements can take up to six months. As a new organization, it will not have the resources to operate without seed funding.

The MVP for Transportation steering committee and the Pre-Policy board is requesting seed money from the Alaska Legislature in the amount of \$1,000,000 to support the formation of MVP for Transportation and to: Initiate the development of the short-term Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and long-term Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), as well as other plans as determined by the Policy Board of the MPO

- Hire an Executive Director to manage the organization in anticipation of receipt of annual federal Planning funds
- Provide membership fees and annual maintenance dues for the State of Alaska ADOT&PF, and others, to become members of the decision-making body of the MPO as members of the Policy Board
- Provide the non-federal share for Planning Funds and possibly capital funds into the future; and
- Operate the MPO

WHEREAS, an MPO is generally comprised of representatives from local governments, transportation stakeholders and governmental transportation authorities that together represent at least 75 percent of the affected population; and

WHEREAS, an MPO has the purpose of ensuring regional cooperation in the transportation planning process and for providing a conduit for the federal funding of transportation projects and programs; and

WHEREAS, in October 2020, a Steering Committee was established, made up of transportation stakeholders of the region, whose mission is to guide the MPO formation process as it relates to presenting recommendations to the Pre-MPO Policy Board regarding the organizational and operational structure; and

WHEREAS, in September 2021, a Pre-MPO Policy Board was established and made up of local government officials, the State of Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, and multi-modal advocates to oversee the development of all federally required documents necessary to be designated by the Governor as the MPO of the Mat-Su urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the Pre-MPO Policy Board, in October 2021, approved the name of the new MPO to be Matsu Valley Planning for Transportation (MVP for Transportation); and

WHEREAS, the Pre-MPO Policy Board, in March 2022, unanimously voted to adopt the formation of an independent 501(c)(3) organization for MVP for Transportation; and

WHEREAS, MVP for Transportation intends to submit an Operating Agreement to the Governor shortly

after the Urbanized Area is officially designated by the U.S. Census; and

WHEREAS, upon designation by the Governor as the new MPO for the Mat-Su urbanized area, MVP for Transportation will need to establish its office, hire staff, open a bank account, file Articles of Incorporation with the State of Alaska Department of Commerce Community and Economic Development Division of Corporations, obtain Business and Professional Licensing to become a non-profit corporation, and negotiate intergovernmental agreements to establish participation by member agencies and associated dues, so that transportation planning work can begin on behalf of the MPO; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Palmer supports the designation of MVP for Transportation as the MPO of the Mat-Su metropolitan planning area.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Palmer supports the allocation of \$1,000,000 in capital funds from the State of Alaska to support the formation, organization, and operation of the MPO.
